White House nominates Sandra Ashworth, Jan Cellucci, and Diane Rivers as NCLIS Commissioners

Washington, DC USA, August 11, 2005—The U.S. National Commission on Libraries and Information Science (NCLIS) today announced that on July 27, 2005 the White House nominated Commissioner Sandra Ashworth of Idaho to a second term expiring July 19, 2009 and nominated Jan Cellucci of Massachusetts and Diane Rivers of Alabama to be members for terms expiring July 19, 2009. All three nominations require U.S. Senate confirmation.

The Honorable Sandra Frances Ashworth has served as a Commissioner since January 2004. She has been the director of the Boundary County District Library, Bonners Ferry, Idaho since 1996. The effectiveness of her library's outreach and partnerships gained national recognition with the 2002 National Award for Library Service given by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and presented by First Lady Laura Bush at a White House ceremony. Ms. Ashworth received statewide recognition for her work on with a 2003 Idaho's Brightest Star Award presented by Governor and Mrs. Kempthorne. Her work as Commissioner has focused on the library and information needs of the elderly and rural populations. She prepared a position paper and participated in the American Library Association pre-White House Conference on Aging in June 2005.

Ms. Jan Cellucci has just returned to Massachusetts after serving from 2001 to 2005 at the Embassy of the United States of America, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada as Advocate for the Canadian Association of Research Libraries. While her husband served as U. S. Ambassador to Canada, she visited over 30 research libraries and archives throughout Canada to promote their services and resources to Canadian decision-makers. She also is a member of the University of British Columbia President's Advisory Council on the University Library. Her previous professional positions include Associate University Librarian for Collection Services, Boston College; Preservation Manager, Boston College Libraries; Library Director, Bancroft School, an independent K-12 day school; Elementary School Media Specialist, Hudson Public School; and Assistant Director, Hudson Public Library. She has an honorary doctorate in Public Service from Simmons College and an MLS in Library and Information Science, Simmons College.
